4 - Cycle Trails:



The Puhi Puhi Valley is a gravel cycle experience that skirts the flanks of the north end of the Seaward Kaikōura range. The climb finishing at Saddle - Advanced Gate, under the second highest peak - 55.6kms return in the Seaward Kaikōuras, Te Ao - 1,178m elevation Whekere at 2,598m.



Nestled between the Seaward and Inland Kaikōura Ranges, Clarence Reserve Station was once one of the country's largest. These days this vast and rugged high-country is part of the Ka Whata Tu o Rakihouia Conservation Park and cyclists have unrestricted access.



5 - Kaikōura's History:

Kaikōura Museum's long term display is uniquely presented in an awardingwinning exhibition area which highlights the district's fascinating connection with the sea.

From the dramatic geological features of the coastline through early Maori settlement, subsequent European development and more recently surfing and tourism, Kaikōura has been shaped and influenced by the abundant marine life and spectacular ocean on its doorstep.

Come and explore the collections and read the stories to discover more about the distinct history of this special place, its people and their journey to where they are today.

From bugs to bats, dinosaurs to dolphins Kaikōura is, or has been, home to a diverse population of creatures. These can be discovered through the museum's impressive

6 - Walk The Peninsula:

The Kaikōura Peninsula Walkway is a scenic coastal trail located on the Kaikōura Peninsula in Kaikōura. It offers breathtaking views of the ocean, mountains and wildlife. Here's some information about the Kaikōura Peninsula Walkway:

Trail Length: The Kaikōura Peninsula Walkway is approximately 11 kilometres (6.8 miles) long, creating a circular loop around the peninsula. The trail takes you along the coastline, providing stunning vistas throughout the hike.

Difficulty Level: The walkway is considered to be of moderate difficulty. While it does involve some uphill and downhill sections, it is suitable for most fitness levels. However, there are a few steeper areas that may require extra caution.

7 - View Marine Birds:

Welcome to where majestic birds soar and dive over stunning waters beneath an endless sky. Discover many species of albatross and pelagic birds on your Albatross Encounter tour, an unforgettable experience in one of New Zealand's most breath-taking destinations.

Within just a small area, you'll meet one of the greatest varieties of seabirds you'll find anywhere along the New Zealand coastline.

The list of seabirds sighted off the Kaikōura Coast include five species of great albatross, up to ten species of the smaller lesser albatross (commonly referred to as mollymawks), ten species of shearwaters, fifteen species of petrel and several other species of seabirds such as shags, prions, penguins, gulls and terns.

10 - Farm To Table Cuisine:

Almost 14 years ago, Chris and Fiona made a life-changing decision to leave the city in search of a closer relationship to nature and its rhythms. The rugged landscape and remote location of Kaikōura had a powerful calling and they purchased a small plot of land with the aim of creating a unique place to rediscover the simple pleasures of sustainably growing, gathering, catching, cooking and sharing quality food with others.

Living in this wild and natural environment, everything they do is centralised around the forces of nature. It influences their creativity, their resourcefulness and appreciation for what is on their door step.

They have the ability to grow a wide variety of plants thanks to Kaikoura's temperate climate. The sea air keeps frosts light in winter and provides a little relief in summer months.

Over ten years they have created a vegetable garden, herb garden, growing tunnel, mixed orchard and a nuttery. Other edible plants are interspersed across the entire property. Their gardens feature a wide variety of native plants which has blossomed into a haven for wildlife as well as providing edible plants for the kitchen.

They focus on raising rare breed animals and their welfare and quality of life is of utmost importance. Their menagerie includes Wessex Saddleback pigs, Belted and White Galloway cattle, Silver Appleyard ducks, Magpie ducks and a mixed flock of heritage hens.

Every plant and animal introduced to the property is carefully considered. Each has a role to play whether it's produce for the dinner table. plants to improve soil health, natural bug control, manure for compost, pollination, shade or shelter.

5 - PurePods:

The Kahutara PurePod is perched high above the Kahutara River with vast views across to the mighty Seaward Kaikōura Mountain Range. It is only 20 minutes inland from Kaikōura.

Driving into the Kahutara PurePod carpark is the start of your unique PurePod adventure as you cross small streams on your way to the secure carpark near the farmhouse. From the carpark, you walk down a grove of trees and across a farm track, in the ever present company of the Seaward Kaikōura Mountain Range.

As you enter the bush pathway on your way to the PurePod, you will encounter a grove of kanuka trees. In the summer, as the kanuka flowers, the ever present hum of pollinators hovers overhead. Your track branches off here as you enjoy the private journey to the Kahutara PurePod.

Kanuka is the endemic form of vegetation on this property as parts of the farm revert back to native bush. The tree is a crucial coloniser of land recovering from deforestation, acting as a nursery plant as other species begin to regrow. Over the past 20 years over 200 acres of this property have been allowed to revert to bush, protecting waterways and hillsides from potential erosion, as well as hosting one of the NZ's largest populations of the South Island Robin.

An added benefit of the Kahutara PurePod is your own 'private' range of foothills bordering the opposite side of the river. While the river is a hundred metres away, down below, you will still hear it in the stillness and its sounds will lull you to sleep at night. The Kahutara PurePod sits on a cute little spur backing onto a large paddock. Nearby kanuka trees shelter the choir of birds you'll hear from dawn to dusk.


1 - Hiku Restaurant:
